As the hottest point of the year approaches in southern India, tank desilting at SEDS is winding up with two large tanks completed this season. CEO Manil Jayasena has put together a "Guide to Readers" on this long running, highly successful and in-demand programme which Partners in Aid has been supporting for two decades.

With drought forcing many farmers to abandon their crops this year, the tank desilting work is more vital than ever, replenishing ground water for crops and wells for drinking water, improving soil quality and providing an alternate income through fish seeding. Thank you to those donors who support this valuable project which ensures improved livelihoods for some of the poorest members of the population in rural southern India. Tank Desilting: A Note for the Reader

Tank Desilting is a program taken up for some of the following reasons:

- To enhance storage capacity in the existing tanks through more efficient catchment which, have been silted from runoff from the hills of soil due to de-forestation.
- To increase water resources through efficient micro catchments based on local knowledge and simple low cost structures.

- To return fertile soils to the farmer lands for higher yields in crops.
- Farmers are able to generate income in balance with their natural environment.
- To ensure that a natural resource is managed efficiently by the community.
- To promote livelihoods for women through kitchen gardens and homestead plantations.
- To promote farmer groups to take up sustainable agricultural practices leading to Low Carbon Farming (mixed cropping, farming with attention for food crops and input cost reduction)
- To promote an ownership of these catchments to the communities.

We try to reach as many farmers as the budget allows.

Water storage capacity has been brought to 125,000,000 gallons by 140 farmers moving 2800 loads, with over 235 hours of the JCB digger running.

When the rains come the tank will store 125,000,000 more gallons of water which will be used for irrigation cattle and for fish rearing as an additional income.



Sinangpad Healthy Village Project

The Sinangpad Healthy Village Project is still going strong. The latest community to participate in the Project is Barangay Pantikian, a tribal village located in the mountainous area of Kalinga. The main source of income is agriculture, but most people are also involved in the traditional mining that takes place within their political/tribal territory. It has 200 households, with a total population of 1173.

Community Health Development training has been carried out by Sinangpad members and the villagers have developed a community action plan intended to provide a healthier environment for adults and children alike. They have decided that their top priority is to ensure all households have sanitary toilets in order that the village can become open defecation free. At the moment, only about 62% (125) households have a toilet.¹ Not surprisingly, therefore, diarrhea is one of the leading causes of morbidity. The agreement that

ABWU

Correspondence from Kolkata tells us that many girls are continuing to reach new heights in their education. It never fails to amaze us how far some have come and it seems more and more each year are making great strides in achieving the best results they can and then going into worthwhile employment and able to fend for themselves as well as assist their families.

As most of the girls are from families who have never been to school, this is wonderful progress. Some of their recent achievements are:

B.Sc. 3rd Year (Pass Course) in Botany, BA graduate working in Marketing, Studying BA, completed Bachelor of Science in Chemistry, Masters degree in Archeology, working in banks and many girls now have much success in nursing. Over the past 6 years or so we have had at least 5 girls complete their nursing training and now placed in various hospitals. Another 2 graduated in March this year and are now also placed in hospitals. We have another 3 who are continuing their training at various levels. The course is 31/2 years and is very full on however they all seem to pass and quickly get a placement in a hospital.

Of course not all girls are academic and the vocational programs are aimed at them. ABWU also have a very popular restaurant within the premises. It is particularly popular with many locals as they serve traditional Bengali food. Girls can train here as well as in the spice grinding, bakery and sanitary napkin project. The sanitary napkin project started a few years ago and has been very successful with girls producing all napkins required by the girls as well as having some outside orders.

EDUCATION FOR ALL

We have been funding this project for the last 2 years. The following will give you an insight to it.

Apart from their own children in the home, this program - 'Education for All' is aimed at helping those children who are have had no form of education at all, slow learners or have a disability of some sort. A Teacher has been appointed specifically to assist these children so that they can cope with their curriculum. The Teacher teaches these children during school hours and some older children, after school hours. All the students under this Program are from marginalized families and their parents are not in a position to send them to a Special School or a regular School.

This program has been very successful and many of the children have now moved into mainstream classrooms

CUTTING AND TAILORING AND MACHINE KNITTING

We have been funding the vocational program projects for over 20 years and there have been many success stories in this time. The prgrams not only provide vocational training but are also intended to empower the girls with self-confidence and skills which enable them to become independent and contribute to their family as well as society. Tailoring/clothing costs are considered quite high in Kolkata so the training is valuable. A number of the ABWU girls are from Bangladesh, many have been trafficked and have to be repatriated. Tailoring/sewing training is given so that they could return back to Bangladesh and earn a living in this way. Some girls are given gift of hand sewing machine when they leave and this helps them to be self-sufficient within their community.

Wool Knitting Project - They have an efficient and regular Knitting Teacher who is teaching the girls various items. They are even taking orders from the Members and staff as well as the Educational Projects. Every year, the Knitting Dept. takes orders of woolen sweaters and cardigans for the children of the Primary School as well as from the crèche. This year, the Knitting Dept. also made cardigans for the adult girls. In the Knitting Section, the girls learnt to knit shawls, stoles, mufflers, cardigans/sweaters, pull-overs, knitted baby sets, baby dresses, etc. The Knitting Section has also been taking orders from customers outside All Bengal Women's Union.

More girls are now taking housekeeping training in hospitals and hotels as there is only 3 months training and at the end they get full time jobs and good salary. There are many large hotels in Kolkata now so their tourism is increasing greatly.

KARATE PROJECT

We have been funding this project for 5-6 years and it has been a runaway success with in excess of 50 girls taking part in training weekly and then sitting external exams. We pay for karate uniforms, training costs and exam fees. The girls are achieving so much and it gives them so much confidence and self-esteem that we are pleased to continue to fund this program.

Belts received March 2016

Blue to Purple- 4 girls; Orange to Blue- 11 girls; Green to Orange- 2 girls; Yellow to Green- 10 girls; White to yellow- 6 girls.

Belts received April 2017

White to Orange- 11 girls; Yellow to Red- 4 girls; Green to Yellow- 2 girls; Blue to Purple- 5 girls; Purple to Purple Strip- 1 girl

It is anticipated there will be a further 2 - 3 exams this current year.

All in all, we continue to be more than happy with all the activities, projects and schooling of so many girls and thank our donors and sponsors without their continued support things could be a lot different.


