1. Background

As part of the process of maintaining public trust, Partners in Aid is committed to achieving fair, well- informed decision-making that is not influenced by a conflict of interest on the part of any Board or Committee member in relation to any of the activities undertaken by the organisation. It is the policy of Partners in Aid that ethical, legal, financial or other conflicts of interest be avoided and that any such conflicts (should they arise) do not conflict with obligations to Partners in Aid.

2. Scope

This Policy applies to all Board members and volunteers involved in project, partnership, or organisational decision-making roles (e.g., Project Coordinators, Committee members, Special Advisors). Hereafter, in this document 'representatives' refers to all Board Members, Project Coordinators, Committee members, and special advisors. The policy also extends to Partners in Aid project partners and associated implementing organisations. Partners in Aid must ensure that all those to whom this policy applies are aware of the ACFID governance standards, and that they disclose any actual or perceived material conflicts of interests as required.

3. Purpose

The purpose of this policy is:

- to help the members to recognise when they have a conflict of interest which should be disclosed to Partners in Aid, and
- to help the Partners in Aid Board effectively identify, disclose and manage any perceived, potential or actual conflict of interest in order to protect the integrity of Partners in Aid and manage any risks that might be associated

with such conflict.

4. Definition of Conflict of Interest

A conflict of interest in Partners in Aid occurs when a member has personal and private interests which appear to be sufficient to potentially result in a clash between the latter's self-interest and the interests of the organisation. Such a conflict can lead to the risk that the person will make a decision based on, or affected by, their private and personal interests, rather than in the best interests of Partners in Aid.

Personal interests include direct interests as well as those of family, friends, or other organisations a person may be involved with or have an interest in. It also includes a conflict between a member's duty to Partners in Aid and another duty that the Board member has.

- A conflict of interest may be actual, potential or perceived and may be financial or non-financial.
- Actual conflict of interest is where an individual is in a situation where his/her official duties can be influenced by his/her private and personal interests.
- Perceived conflict of interest is where an individual is in a situation where his/her official duties can appear to be influenced by his/her private and personal interests.
- Potential conflict of interest is where an individual is in a situation where his/her official duties may be influenced in the future by his/her private and personal interests.

5. Procedures

5.1 Member's Responsibilities

- 5.1.1 All members are required to:
- avoid conflicts of interest where possible, and
 - identify and disclose to the Board any conflicts of interest that come to exist.
- 5.1.2 Board and Committee members are required to:
- carefully manage any conflicts of interest,
 - follow this policy and respond to any breaches, and
 - monitor compliance with this policy.
- 5.1.3 At each Board and Committee meeting, participants will be asked to disclose if they have any conflict of interest.
- 5.1.4 Once an actual, potential, or perceived conflict of interest is identified, it will be entered into a register of interests, as well as being raised with the Board. The register of interests will be maintained by the Partners in Aid Board Secretary, who will record information related to any conflict of interest, including the nature and extent of the conflict of interest and any steps taken to address it.

- 5.1.5 Once the conflict of interest has been appropriately disclosed, the Board or Committee (excluding the member disclosing and any other conflicted member) must decide whether the conflicted members should be eligible to:
- vote on the matter,
 - participate in any debate relevant to the matter, or
 - be present in the room during the debate and the voting on the matter.
- 5.1.6 In deciding what approach to take, the Board will consider:
- whether the conflict needs to be avoided or simply documented,
 - whether the conflict will realistically impair the disclosing person's capacity to impartially participate in decision-making,
 - alternative options to avoid the conflict, and
 - the possibility of creating an appearance of improper conduct that might impair confidence in, or the reputation of, Partners in Aid.
- 5.1.7 The approval of any action requires the agreement of at least a majority of the Board / Committee (excluding any conflicted board member/s) who are present and voting at the meeting. The action and result of the voting will be recorded in the minutes of the meeting and in the conflict of interests register.

5.2 Compliance with this Policy

- 5.2.1 If the Board has a reason to believe that a person has failed to comply with it, it will investigate the circumstances.
- 5.2.2 If it is found that this person has failed to disclose a conflict of interest, the Board may take action against him/her. This may include seeking to terminate his/her relationship with Partners in Aid.
- 5.2.3 If a person suspects that a member has failed to disclose a conflict of interest, he/she must notify the Board.

6. Review

This policy and the register will be reviewed on an annual basis, following the annual general meeting, to ensure that the policy is operating effectively.
